## **NEW COST OF LIVING STATS RELEASED:** New research (July 2022) shows:

17% people in Wales worry they won't keep up with their energy bills over the next 3 months.





8% of people in Wales or more than 100,000 households are already living on a negative budget.

33% of people in Wales anticipate needing to cut down or stop spending on broadband in the next 6 months





Since March we've helped more than 2000 people in Wales access fuel vouchers and 7700 people with food bank referrals.

## Energy shock for thousands as price cap predicted to jump again

With new forecasts from industry analyst Cornwall Insight predicting **a price cap of £3,244 from October** (£106 a month more than the current price cap), we know that households are yet to face the sharpest end of this crisis.¹ Our new polling shows that households are vulnerable to further increases this year and are already struggling to keep up with rising costs.² Whilst support from both the Welsh and UK government is welcome, new figures suggest that many households are still likely to struggle to meet their basic needs in the months ahead.

Despite support available, we are hearing from clients who are already unable to cover their costs and are worried about the year ahead. For people struggling now, we are concerned that people who may build up debts or need to use emergency support such as food banks and fuel vouchers at this point in the year, may be particularly vulnerable to further cost increases in the months ahead.

## Key issues for policy makers

- Some people in Wales are already facing costs that exceed their income or have little flexibility in their budget
- Our recent polling estimates that **8% of people in Wales** or more than 100,000 households are already **living on a negative budget.**<sup>3</sup>
- Another 11% of people in Wales (nearly 149,000 households) have £100 or less after costs.
- In March, before the most recent energy price cap increase the % of **Citizens Advice debt clients** who were **living on a negative budget reached 46%**. Up from 36% in early 2019.
- 2. Households are already falling behind on bill payments or worry they will soon
  - Despite support, our recent polling shows that **28% of people in Wales are currently behind on a bill or payment** and are most likely to be behind on council tax, water or energy bills. For people already struggling to keep up with bills, the financial support provided by the government may simply be absorbed by their arrears rather than help them to meet their basic needs in the months ahead.
  - We also know that people are worried about whether they can afford essential bill
    payments in the coming months. In June, 17% said they were not confident they
    would be able to keep up with their energy bills over the next 3 months, 13% said
    this for their rent, and 12% for both council tax and food costs.
- 3. Many people in Wales are already cutting back
  - Recent polling estimated that 41% of people in Wales have already cut back/stopped spending on energy and 51% have cut back/stopped spending on food/household goods over the last 6 months.
  - Looking ahead, more anticipate they will need to cutback over the next 6 months, both on essential bills, such as **energy** (53%) and **food/ household goods** (56%), and on other costs such as **broadband** (33%) and **mobile phone contracts** (34%).
